

Over the next three weeks, all of the Kensington campuses will be exploring what it looks like to find our identity in God by studying the book of Ephesians.

Our world often defines people by social status, financial situation, relationships, careers, and many other labels, characteristics, or traits. If you think about it, you might even identify yourself by these things as well.

But what happens when one of these things changes? What happens when we lose our job, money starts to get tight, our relationship status changes, or when we have to move to a new city and find a new community?

We might start to experience an identity crisis.

Luckily, God has given us an identity that can never be changed or taken away! And an important part of becoming a follower of Jesus is the realization and acceptance of that identity.

As we jump into the new year, we want our church to process, understand, and accept what it means to find our identity in Christ. This digital devotional is a companion piece to the Sunday services and the *ID Renewal* sermon series. It can help you to think about who God says you are, and what that means for your life. Everyday for the rest of the month, you will receive something to read, listen to, or think about. It might be a blog post, a guided prayer, a worship playlist, or an activity that you can do to draw you closer to God.

# Imago Dei: Identity

January 9, 2023 - Part 1 of 3

There is an ancient theological concept called *imago Dei*, which is Latin for "made in the image of God." It comes from the very first chapter of the Bible at the peak of the creation story, where God says,

"Let us make human beings in our image, to be like us... So God created human beings in His own image. In the image of God he created them; male and female he created them.<sup>[a]</sup>"

God created every last bit of the world, and filled it with beauty and wonder. But the sky, mountains, oceans, bugs, animals and birds are not marked by God's image. Only humanity was given the inherent gift of being *imago Dei*.

This was a declaration of God's love, built into our very DNA. With this specific label, you were named as a child of God, blessed with a unique standing and station at the apex in the created world. Without presenting any of our own abilities, skills, or accomplishments, we were made with love and given significance just because of who were were made to be.

This powerful declaration of love marks each one of us with an identity, purpose, and place of belonging that can never be revoked, ignored, or diminished.

### Identity

When we talk about our identity, we're asking, "Who am I, and why do I matter?"

It can be easy to think that our identity is just made up of our abilities and skills, our career, our relationships, the things we've accomplished, our physical features, our tax bracket, or a myriad of other identifiers.

The problem with this is that all of these things are just helpful descriptions of our circumstances, choices, and preferences: they do not determine our value, worth, or dignity.

Each of these identifiers can be changed, removed, or added to us. If our identity is rooted in our career, and we lose or change our job, how does that change who we are? Or if our identity is rooted in our relationships, and we go through a breakup, divorce, or loss, who does that make us now?

We need an identity that is anchored in something that does not change, something that no circumstances can unravel, something that maintains self-worth and value regardless of performance or circumstance.

Thankfully, the *imago Dei* answers this question for us. Because of God's great love — abundantly declared over you from the beginning of time<sup>[b]</sup>— you are worthy. You have dignity because God has distinguished you through his love. You have value, simply because you are a beloved child of God.<sup>[c]</sup>

#### Think about this

Take some time to read and reflect on this passage from <u>Psalm 139:1-16</u>.

In this Psalm, King David proclaims God's love for Him, and how intimately He is known and cared for.

Consider what this might mean for you:

What verse stands out the most to you? Why?

How does it make you feel that God knows and loves you this deeply?

How might this Psalm help you understand your identity as someone who is made in the image of God?

Is there something in this Psalm, or about *imago Dei*, that doesn't make sense? Who might you be able to talk to, or where might you be able to find answers to your questions?

### Pray

As you wrap up today's devotional, talk to God about your identity as someone made *imago Dei*.

Thank God for making you imago Dei.

**Describe** what it means to be loved by God, regardless of anything you do, say, or think.

Ask God to teach you more about how your identity is formed by how you have been made in His image.

Look for moments in the next week where you reflect God's image to the world by exhibiting the

# Imago Dei: Purpose

January 10, 2023 - Part 2 of 3

#### Purpose

Have you ever asked yourself, "What is my purpose in life?"

We all have different ways that we might answer this question. Your individual response probably depends on what you were taught growing up, what vocation you have, and what kind of life you lead. Maybe it's tied to your personality or skillset — maybe your education, or your dreams for the future.

But underneath our own goals, aspirations, and sense of calling, we all have an underlying purpose, given to us by our Creator through our *imago Dei* identity.

Jesus, when asked what is the most important thing in life, replied with a two-part answer:

"You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, and all your mind.' This is the first and greatest commandment. A second is equally important: 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' The entire law and all the demands of the prophets are based on these two commandments."

This is our foundational purpose. It may seem too simple to be so important, but to God, this is *everything*.

The only thing that God wants for us is a loving relationship with Him, and for that love to spread to one another.<sup>[a]</sup>

Purpose naturally flows out of our identity because what we do is dependent on who we are. If *imago Dei* answers the question, "Who am I?" it also answers the question, "What am I here for?"

Colossians 3:12-14 says,

Since God chose you to be the holy people he loves, you must clothe yourselves with tenderhearted mercy, kindness, humility, gentleness, and patience. Make allowance for each other's faults, and forgive anyone who offends you. Remember, the Lord forgave you, so you must forgive others. Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds us all together in perfect harmony.<sup>[b]</sup>

As image-bearers of God, We have been called to pass along the love that has been bestowed on us. Everything else that we do, and every role that we take on, is done under the mandate of love.<sup>[C]</sup>

For example, maybe you are a student. When you go to school, one purpose might be to get good grades or earn a diploma or degree. However, if we consider our identity in God, a greater purpose at school is also to showcase the love of God to the people around you.

The same is true in the workforce, in your relationships, and around your community. We are to bear witness to the nature of God, by exemplifying His love to those around us.

Because of our local contexts, personality types, skills, spiritual gifts, and history, how we achieve this purpose might look different from one person to another. But we all together make up the body of Christ, on mission to show the love of Jesus to all people.<sup>[d]</sup>

### Think about this

How does someone show that they love God with all their heart, mind, and soul?

What might it look like for you to love your neighbor?

Which of the traits listed in Colossians 3 come easy for you? Which ones are more of a challenge?

How does God's greater foundational purpose of love interact with your dreams, vision, and hope for the future?

### Pray

As you wrap up today's devotional, talk to God about your purpose as someone made *imago Dei*.

Thank God for giving you an ultimate purpose that flows out of your identity as a Child of God.

**Describe** how your gifts, talents, skills, and personality can be used to pass along the love of God to the people around you.

Ask God to open your eyes, ears, heart, and mind to new opportunities to show love to the people around you. Ask Him to make you aware of circumstances, situations, and people that you might not usually notice.

Look for moments in the next week where you reflect God's image to the world by exhibiting the attributes of God e





# Imago Dei: Belonging

January 11, 2023 - Part 3 of 3

### Belonging

Human beings are social creatures. We are naturally wired to seek out places and people that make us feel like we "fit-in."

Sometimes this desire can tempt us into changing who we are in order to be accepted and liked. We crave belonging, so we are willing to sacrifice and change our identity to get it.

Brené Brown — author, social worker and researcher says in her book, Imperfection, [a]

"If we want to fully experience love and belonging, we must believe that we are worthy of love and belonging."

When our identity is not anchored in something stable and permanent, like *imago Dei*, we believe that our value comes from the approval of others. This means that our idea of self-worth and ability to find connection and belonging also becomes tied to what others think of us.

Although we are called to love the people around us, the approval and adoration of others does not define us or determine whether or not we are worthy of dignity and acceptance.

As we said in <u>Part 1</u>, only God can define you, and he calls you his beloved child, and royal heirs in the kingdom of Heaven.<sup>[b]</sup> Just as God's love gives us a foundational sense of worth and purpose — regardless of anything else in our life — we have also been given a place of belonging in the family of God.

What if we want to believe we are loved and accepted by God, but our thoughts and feelings are obstacles? Often, changes in the pattern of our thinking happens in small shifts, day by day. As image bearers, we have the ability to change the way we think. We can acknowledge the inner conflict, release it to God, and keep telling ourselves the Truth until it becomes familiar.

God made you, just as you are, and wants you to be yourself. When we accept who God has made us to be – and live as our authentic selves made in the image of God – we find belonging. Just as we might look like our parents, we look like our Heavenly Father. God, by making us in his image, has claimed us as a part of his family.<sup>[d]</sup>

### Think about this

Have you ever tried to change who you are in order

#### to fit in? How did it go?

Is there a difference between *fitting in* and *belonging*? Why or why not?

Who is your most authentic self? What traits, characteristics, and attitudes come to light when you are that person?

Read 2 Corinthians 5:17<sup>[e]</sup>

This means that anyone who belongs to Christ has become a new person. The old life is gone; a new life has begun!

What do you think the writer means by "The old life is gone; a new life has begun?"

What does it look like to have a new life in Christ?

### Pray

As you wrap up today's devotional, talk to God about how you find belonging as someone made *imago Dei*.

Thank God for giving you a place to belong that flows out of your identity as a Child of God.

Describe what it means to you to belong to God, regardless of anything else going on in your life.

Ask God to help you be the person he created you to be. Talk to God about places in your life where you are still living "the old life," and how you might accept the "new life" in Christ.

Look for moments in the next week where you reflect God's image to the world by living into your belonging as a Child of God. [1]

Here are a few suggestions that can help you get started. Be specific when making your list:

Now consider what that list means to you by reflecting on these questions:

What stands out? Are there things on your list that surprised you?

Are there any particular themes or narratives that show up in your identity?

Do you identify yourself more by who you are and the things you have, or by who you are not and the things you do not have?

If one of those things changed or was taken away, how would that impact you?

Do the things that are most significant to you determine your value as a person? Should they qualify the level of dignity or respect you have? Do these things quantify how much you are worth? Does the way you live reflect the way you answered?

What might God think about the ways you identify yourself? Would He put the same significance on these things?

#### Think about this

All of the ways that you identify yourself are important. They are what make you unique!

However, they are not the things that determine your identity — that is — your standing and significance in the world.

Because you are made in the image of God, you have fundamental value and dignity. You bear the image of God and are a reflection of his love, creativity, grace, mercy, and justice in the world. Those qualities that you inherently possess give you an identity and purpose before anything else that you might have listed above. The things that you have achieved are not what gives you implicit worth. Your relationship status does not automatically define your station in life. Your history does not determine your dignity. You are made in the image of God, and therefore are a person of divine status, value, and honor. Nothing you do or say — nor anything said or done against you — can change this fact. Because God loves you for who you are; you are desired, important, and influential.

We encourage you to spend some time in prayer today, reflecting on how your list of identities can describe you, but only God can define you.

If you need, here's a worship song called <u>Jireh by</u> <u>Maverick City</u>, that talks about how God loves and cares for us through the lens of Matthew 6:26-32 <sup>[a]</sup>.The chorus says,

I'm already loved. I'm already chosen. I know who I am; I know what You've spoken. I'm already loved more than I could imagine. And that is enough.

Use this song and these words as a prayerful reflection on who God says you are, and how we cares and loves for you.

# The identity of me & YOU

January 15, 2023

Being made in the image of God not only provides us with an identity, purpose, and belonging; it demands that we treat one another with a love and dignity that the image of God deserves.

Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. once wrote, a

"This innate worth referred to in the phrase the image of God is universally shared in equal portions by all men. There is no graded scale of essential worth; there is no divine right of one which differs from the right of another. Every human being has etched in his personality the indelible stamp of the Creator."

Dr. King and the civil rights movement strove to help people see the image of God in one another. In his writing and public theology, Dr. King frequently referred to the work of German philosopher Martin Buber and his concept of *I-Thou Relationships*.<sup>[b]</sup>

Buber found that in an *I-Thou* relationship, people see each other for who they are: as wonderfully complex and unique reflections of the divine image of God. This means that they treat each other with love, dignity, respect, grace, compassion, and charity.

This is in contrast to an *I-It* relationship, where an individual relegates another to an object. They neglect to see the person in front of them for anything other than a thing to be ignored, neglected, conceptualized, influenced, or manipulated.

It can be surprisingly easy, whether we like to admit it or not, to see other people in this *I-It* view. It's not something that we do intentionally — but usually, without a personal relationship with someone — it can be hard to see others as unique, beautiful, individuals that are equally and overwhelmingly loved by our creator God.

Jesus talks a little bit about this in Matthew 25:34-40. While talking with his Disciples before he goes to the cross, he gives them a vision for the future, when all the nations gather before the throne of God for the final judgement.

"Then these righteous ones will reply, 'Lord, when did we ever see you hungry and feed you? Or thirsty and give you something to drink? Or a stranger and show you hospitality? Or naked and give you clothing? When did we ever see you sick or in prison and visit you?'

"And the King will say, 'I tell you the truth, when you did it to one of the least of these my brothers and sisters, you were doing it to me!'

God made all people in the image of God, and we all bear his likeness to the world around us. This is not just something that gives us identity, purpose, and belonging: it gives us a vision and mission for how we treat one another.

#### Think about this

Being made *imago Dei* allows us to identify our brothers and sisters through the lens of God's love acknowledging their respective dignity, purpose, and inclusion in the Kingdom of God — and extend the compassion, care, and love of Christ to one another.

1 John 3:16-19<sup>[e]</sup>, James 2:14-26<sup>[f]</sup>, Romans 12:9-21 <sup>[g]</sup> and John 13:1-12;35<sup>[f]</sup> all give insight into what it looks like to live in this way.

Reflect on these passages, then consider these questions.

- Which of these verses stands out the most to you?
- What themes or virtues do you notice running through these four excerpts of scripture?
- How might your life change in light of these instructions?
- Have you ever experienced an *I-It* relationship from the perspective of the It? How did it feel?
- What might an *I-Thou* relationship with you look like?
- What makes *I-Thou* relationships so challenging?

### Pray

As you wrap up today's devotional, talk to God about how you see others in the light of the *imago Dei*.

**Thank** God for sharing His image with the human race. Express your gratitude for the ability to have *I*-*Thou* relationships with others.

**Describe** to God the meaningful *I-Thou* relationships in your life. Talk to Him about specific *I-Thou* connections you have made with others.

Ask God to open your eyes, ears, heart, and mind to the people around you who might tend to have an *I*-*It* relationship with you.

Look for moments in the next week where you reflect God's image to the world by approaching other people with a radical love, respect, grace, mercy, and compassion.<sup>[f]</sup>



# **Being Yourself**

January 16, 2023

It can be easy to play the comparison game.

Especially in a world where social media and "personal branding" are all about presenting our best selves to the world. As we scroll on Facebook, Instagram, and TikTok we are — consciously or unconsciously — comparing ourselves and our lives to one another.

You might find yourself saying;



These jealous narratives are easy to listen to and incredibly difficult to tune out. That makes it even more important to make sure that we are clinging to the truth – what God says about who we are.

In 1 Corinthians 12, the Apostle Paul uses a metaphor of a body to explain how we are all uniquely created and

designed with significance and purpose.

"Yes, the body has many different parts, not just one part. If the foot says, "I am not a part of the body because I am not a hand," that does not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear says, "I am not part of the body because I am not an eye," would that make it any less a part of the body? If the whole body were an eye, how would you hear? Or if your

# whole body were an ear, how would you smell anything?<sup>[a]</sup>

When we play the comparison game and wish that we were different from the person we are, it's like we are saying "I am a foot but I wish that I was an eye."

God has created you exactly as He intended.<sup>[b]</sup> He gave you a unique personality, skill set, sense of humor, passions, desires, traits, and more. He did not want you to be anyone other than yourself.

If we try to change who we are into something other than what God created, we are cheating ourselves out of our divinely directed identity.

Even if there are parts of our lives that we wish were different and looking to change, we need to make sure that the person we are becoming is the person that God wants us to be. Sometimes we wish we were made in the image of our friends, celebrities, or an image of ourselves we've created in our minds, instead of in the image of God.

This is what it means to be a follower of Jesus: to continually discover what it looks like to live a transformed life as ourselves. C As we learn more about Jesus, we find out more about God. As we grow in our understanding of God, we take on the characteristics of the one who created us. As this change takes root in our hearts, we discover more about how our individual gifts, skills, passions, and personalities reflect and glorify the Lord.

This allows us to be ourselves — just as God intended. We don't have to try to be anyone else: not our friends, not our siblings, not the celebrities and influencers we see on our social feeds. We don't even have to pretend to be a perfect version of ourselves. We are fully known and fully loved just as we are.

### Pray

Here is a prayer by John O'Donohue about coming to realize how deeply loved and uniquely created you are. In everything that God made, He chose to make you exactly as you are, with greater plan and purpose.

As we close todays devotional, use this prayer to reflect on your identity, and how you belong to the body of Christ.

May you recognizing in your life the presence, power, and light of your soul.

May you realize that you are never alone, that your soul in all it's brightness and belonging connects you intimately with the rhythm of the universe.

May you have respect for individuality and difference.

May you realize that the shape of your soul is unique, that you have a special destiny here, that behind the façade of your life there is something beautiful and eternal happening.

May you learn to see yourself with the same delight, pride, and expectation with which God sees you in every moment.

# **Knowing Yourself**

January 19, 2023

There is an ancient Greek expression attributed to Socrates;

"To know thyself is the beginning of wisdom."[a]

Many philosophers, artists, musicians, and deep-thinkers over the course of history have explored and expounded upon this very thought.<sup>[b]</sup> As Christians, we can find similar themes throughout Scripture.

God has revealed many aspects of Himself throughout all of creation.<sup>[c]</sup> However, He has shown Himself most through the attributes that humans possess that reflect His characteristics.<sup>[d]</sup>

Since we are made in the image of God, it is imperative that we understand ourselves. Because when we know ourselves, we can better comprehend who God is.

Thomas Merton, a Trappist monk<sup>[e]</sup> once wrote,

The secret of my identity is hidden in the love and mercy of God.

But whatever is in God is really identical with Him, for His infinite simplicity admits no division and no distinction. Therefore I cannot hope to find myself anywhere except in Him.

Ultimately the only way that I can be myself is to become identified with Him in whom is hidden the reason and fulfillment of my existence.

Therefore there is only one problem on which all my existence, my peace, and my happiness depend: to discover myself in discovering God. If I find Him I will find myself and if I find my true self I will find Him.<sup>[f]</sup>

What Merton found is that the more he explored God, the more he discovered about himself. And the more he explored himself — his identity, purpose, and sense of belonging — the more he saw God.

It can sometimes be easy to think that the goal of the Christian life is to only grow in knowledge of God. But what He really wants is for us to also understand ourselves in the light of who He is.<sup>[g]</sup>

David G. Benner, psychologist and author of *The Gift of Being Yourself,* says;

We are graven on the palms of God's hands and never out of the Divine mind. All our knowledge of God depends on God's sustained initiative in knowing us. We know God, because God first knew us, and continues to know us. "In

To "know ourselves," like Socrates encouraged his followers to do, we must start by knowing God. When we understand how God sees us — with an abundance of love, care, grace, and mercy — we understand who we were designed to be.

#### Think about this

#### David G. Benner also wrote,

"An identity grounded in God would mean that when we think of who we are, the first thing that would come to mind is our status as someone who is deeply loved by God."

Consider these questions;

When you think of you who are, what comes to mind first?

How does your "status as someone who is deeply loved by God" change or impact the way you view yourself?

How do you know that you are deeply loved by God?

#### Prayer

St. Augustine of Hippo, a theologian and philosopher from the fifth century, prayed,

"Grant, Lord, that I may know myself that I may know thee."

Repeat this prayer throughout the day as a simple guide to meditate on what it means to know God and be known by God.

# Your Spiritual D.N.A.

January 21, 2023

Ephesians 4 says,

Now these are the gifts Christ gave to the church: the apostles, the prophets, the evangelists, and the pastors and teachers. Their responsibility is to equip God's people to do his work and build up the church, the body of Christ...

He makes the whole body fit together perfectly. As each part does its own special work, it helps the other parts grow, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love.<sup>[a]</sup>

You are an essential part of the body of Christ because no one else can do what you do. All of us in the body of Christ can use our unique gift-set as an <u>apostle</u>, <u>prophet</u>, <u>evangelist</u>, <u>pastor</u>, or <u>teacher</u>.

# The Armor of God

January 22, 2023

In the book of Ephesians, the Apostle Paul writes about the armor of God:

Therefore put on the full armor of God, so that when the day of evil comes, you may be able to stand your ground, and after you have done everything, to stand. Stand firm then, with the belt of truth buckled around your waist, with the breastplate of righteousness in place, and with your feet fitted with the readiness that comes from the gospel of peace. In addition to all this, take up the shield of faith, with which you can extinguish all the flaming arrows of the evil one. Take the helmet of salvation and the sword of the Spirit, which is the word of God. a

This metaphorical armor is a reference to the prophetic depiction and characteristics of the Messiah (Jesus) drawn from the book of Isaiah.<sup>[b]</sup> Through the imagery of armor Paul is imploring the followers of Jesus to "put

# on" our identity in Christ, and take on the characteristics of Jesus.

When we put on the belt of truth, we are reminded of our identity in Christ as children of God, made in His image and loved unconditionally.<sup>[c]</sup> The breastplate of righteousness reminds us that through faith in Jesus, we have been made righteous in God's eyes and are no longer defined by our sins.<sup>[d]</sup> The shoes of peace remind us that in Jesus, we have been given peace with God and the ability to experience peace in our hearts and minds, regardless of our circumstances.<sup>[e]</sup> The shield of faith reminds us that through faith in Jesus, we can overcome any obstacle the enemy throws our way.<sup>[f]</sup>

The helmet of salvation reminds us that in Jesus, we have been saved from eternal death and given the gift of eternal life.<sup>[g]</sup> And the sword of the Spirit reminds us that through the power of the Holy Spirit, we have been given the ability to stand firm in our faith and resist the enemy's temptations.<sup>[h]</sup>

As we put on the armor of God, let us remember our identity in Christ and the power and protection that is ours through faith in Him. Let us stand firm in our faith, hold fast to our identity, knowing that we are belong wholly to the Lord.

May this devotional encourage you to put on the full armor of God and to know that you are victorious in Christ.

### Think about this

As you think about the armor of God and your identity in Christ, consider the following questions:

What questions do you have about the armor of God?

Which of the pieces of armor stand out most to you?

How does this armor protect your identity in Christ?

Of all the pieces of armor in this metaphor (belt, breastplate, shoes, shield, and helmet) which are the easiest for you to put on? Which is the mot difficult? The armor of God is more defensive protection than offensive weaponry: why might that be?

Why might all of these pieces of armor be important? What happens if you are able to put on some of these pieces, but not all of them?

### Pray

We are going to pray through the armor of God. If you are reading this in a group, pray this prayer out loud or take turns reading over the various paragraphs.

"Heavenly Father,

Today, as I put on the armor of God, I ask that you surround me and assure me of my identity in you. Thank you for giving us this armor to protect and comfort us as we face uncertainty, doubt, temptation, and fear. Help me not to forget them in times of health, prosperity, and joy.

**Belt of Truth** - God, help me remember the truth: that I am your beloved child, made in your image. Remind me throughout the day that I belong to you, regardless of my circumstances, situations, and actions.

*Breastplate of Righteousness* - Father, help me to follow your guidance to live like Christ. Give me the opportunity to show love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control.

*Shoes of Peace* - Thank you, Lord, for the Gospel of peace. Help me to walk everywhere with the assurance of your freedom and comfort, knowing that you are with me as a protector and provider.

Allow me to be a peacemaker: sharing your Gospel wherever I go.

*Shield of Faith* - Lord, as I pick up this shield of faith, I declare that I will trust you will provide all I need. I trust that you will strengthen me to overcome temptation and deliver me from evil.

*Helmet of Salvation* - Jesus, I am so grateful that you redeemed me of my sins and are continually restoring me in righteousness. Grant me the courage and strength to embrace this gift daily, and allow your compassion and love to transform who I am to look more like you.

*Sword of the Spirit* - Thank you, God, for the gift of your Holy Spirit. Through your Spirit I can understand, know, and discern who you are, who I am, and what you want me to do. I pray that you continue to reveal yourself to me, guiding me, and giving me wisdom; so that I may continue to grow into my identity in you.

## Known by your Fruit

January 25, 2023

Over the last few weeks, we've talked about what it means to have our identity in Christ, and how we can embrace that identity. But how do you know if your identity has truly taken root in God?

Jesus, in Matthew 7, says that his disciples will be *known* by their fruit.

"You can identify [true disciples] by their fruit, that is, by the way they act. Can you pick grapes from thorn bushes, or figs from thistles? A good tree produces good fruit, and a bad tree produces bad fruit. A good tree can't produce bad fruit, and a bad tree can't produce good fruit. So every tree that does not produce good fruit is chopped down and thrown into the fire. Yes, just as you can identify a tree by its fruit, so you can identify people by their actions."[a]

The goal of the Christian life is to be transformed and to take on Christ-like characteristics and traits. We move from being made in the image of God — as all humans are — to a tangible reflection of Christ Jesus here and now.

When He says that His followers will be known by the *fruit they bear*, Jesus is referring to the fruits of the Spirit, which the apostle Paul explains in Galatians 5:

"But the Holy Spirit produces this kind of fruit in our lives: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control... Since we are living by the Spirit, let us follow the Spirit's leading in every part of our lives. "

The more we live into our identity in Christ — rather than our own identity or vision for ourselves – the more we will see these traits take form. This is what Jesus means when He says, "*my followers will be known by their fruit.*"

When we accept our identity in Christ and allow ourselves to be shaped and transformed by the Holy Spirit, we will find that we become more loving, joyful, peaceful, patient, kind, good, faithful, gentle, and selfcontrolled.

That doesn't mean that we automatically become the most loving, or most patient, or most gentle person of all time. It simply means that we are growing in these areas. The Fruits of the Spirit are a good litmus test for spiritual transformation.

We can ask ourselves:

- Do people know me for my love and joy?
- Have I shown patience when it would be easy to be angry or frustrated?
- When have I kept or made peace with others

#### recently?

- How does "gentleness" show up in my personality?
- What does the self-control of Jesus look like in my own life?

As we exemplify the fruits of the Spirit in our lives, we accept our identity and purpose in the body of Christ. We are witnesses of the love, mercy, and grace of God to the world around us: representing the transforming power of a life with Jesus. Through this witness, we participate in the re-creation and restoration of creation, and help bring the Kingdom of Heaven to earth.

#### Think about this

Which fruit of the Spirit comes most naturally for you? Which is the most challenging? Why might that be?

When is it easy to show the Fruits of the Spirit? When is it more difficult?

When was the last time you portrayed one of these fruits? What did it look like?

How can you continue to develop these Fruits of the Spirit? Read John 15:1-17, and consider what comes to mind for you.

How does showing the Fruits of the Spirit help bring the Kingdom of Heaven to Earth?

Can you name someone who portrays each of these fruits? Make a list and let those people know you see Jesus through them.

#### Pray

Take some time to pray about these fruits of the Spirit.

### LOVE, JOY, PEACE, PATIENCE, KINDNESS, GOODNESS, GENTLENESS, FAITHFULNESS, SELF-CONTROL

Thank God for giving us access to His characteristics and attributes.

**Describe** to God how you have seen these Fruits of the Spirit in Him, in others, and in yourself.

Ask God to help you to continue to grow in the Fruits of the Spirit, and to be known by these actions. Specifically, name the Fruits that may be more challenging for you.

Look for moments in the next week where you have the divine opportunity to showcase the love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, gentleness, faithful, and self-control of Jesus at your work, in your home, or in your community.




### **ID RENEWAL** Digital Devotional
