

# Every[one] Everywhere: Continued Availability

March 22, 2026

Scripture: Psalm 95:1-2; 2 Chronicles 16:9a; Isaiah 6:8

**Read the scripture noted above together:** Take turns reading if you prefer. Enjoy the different Bible translations we each read.

**Discuss the following context:** Choosing to live with an open, responsive posture toward God—showing up again and again with our time, our presence, and our willingness—is celebrating what God *has* done while staying expectant for what He *will* do. When we keep showing up, God keeps using us. This moment isn't the finish line – it's the starting line of a lifestyle of expectancy of what God will continue to do.

God is not looking for the most talented, successful, or impressive – but for those willing, surrendered and available. In the Old Testament, Isaiah hears the call: “*Whom shall I send?*” His response is “*Here I am. Send me.*” (**Isaiah 6:8**) Isaiah models a heart ready before knowing the assignment. Availability is openness, responsiveness, and readiness to be used by God.

## Share your thoughts about the following questions:

1. Why does consistent availability matter more than one-time moments of obedience?
2. What keeps us from living with ongoing openness to God's leading? What changes when we adjust our schedules and priorities to align with God's purposes?
3. Jesus often paused for people others overlooked. Where do you see “margins” in your own life where God might be inviting you to slow down and be available to someone in need?
4. What practical steps can you take this week to consistently “show up” for God, even when you don't yet know what He will ask you to do?

**Pray together:** Ask each other to share what is on your heart today.

*Thank God* for what He has done and what He will do next.

*Ask God* to help us posture our hearts to say: God, here we are. Send us. Use us. We are available for whatever you want.

*Praise God* that He is not looking for the most talented, successful, or impressive – but for those willing, surrendered and available. We can be used by Him!



# Every[one] Everywhere: A Poured Out Life

March 15, 2026

**Scripture: Deuteronomy 15:10-11; 2 Corinthians 9:6-8;  
Acts 20:35; 1 Timothy 6:18-19**

**Read the scripture noted above together:** Take turns reading if you prefer. Enjoy the different Bible translations we each read.

**Discuss the following context:** Open-handed generosity transforms our hearts, reflects the character of God, and multiplies blessings when we trustingly give all that God has entrusted to us. Open-handed generosity challenges us to surrender control and trust God with our resources. It invites us to see everything we have as God's and to use it to bless others, reflecting His generous heart.

Generosity is not just about money—it's a lifestyle of recognizing the needs, dignity, and worth of others. When we live open-handedly, we experience joy, freedom, and the eternal impact of partnering with God's kingdom work.

**Share your thoughts about the following questions:**

1. How does recognizing the dignity, needs, and worth of others shape the way we practice generosity in our daily lives?
2. What changes when we view ourselves not as owners but as managers of what God has entrusted to us?
3. How does gratitude shift our mindset from scarcity to abundance? How have you experienced generosity in your own life?
4. What might it look like to practice open-handed generosity as a way of life—especially when it requires releasing control or comfort?

**Pray together:** Ask each other to share what is on your heart today.

*Thank God* we are called to live a life that reflects Jesus – intentional and sacrificial – and in that we experience a life of joy, freedom, and impact.

*Ask God* to help us see the needs before us, give with joy, and live open-handed.

*Praise God* we have the opportunity to trust God with our resources and to partner in God's kingdom work.



# Every[one] Everywhere: Keep On Doing Good

March 8, 2026

Scripture: Galatians 6:9-10; James 2:14-17; Hebrews 13:16

**Read the scripture noted above together:** Take turns reading if you prefer. Enjoy the different Bible translations we each read.

**Discuss the following context:** Following Christ means persevering in doing good even when weariness, discouragement, or lack of recognition make it difficult, because God sees every faithful act and brings a harvest from it (**Galatians 6:9-10**). Genuine faith expresses itself through practical love, meeting needs with action rather than words alone (**James 2:14-17**). Ultimately, we keep doing good because of who Jesus is and His example of sacrificial goodness, not because of how others respond (**Hebrews 13:16**).

**Share your thoughts about the following questions:**

1. Why should we keep doing good even when it feels unnoticed or unrewarded? How does perseverance in doing good connect to faith and trust in God?
2. What does it look like to make love and service a lifestyle rather than an occasional act?
3. How can small, everyday acts of goodness impact the Kingdom of God?
4. In what ways does God use our faithful, consistent goodness to bring hope, transformation, and blessing to others?

**Pray together:** Ask each other to share what is on your heart today.

*Thank God* that the seeds we plant today become tomorrow's harvest. Our goodness is never wasted – He is always using it.

*Ask God* to let His promises strengthen our perseverance.

*Praise God* that our faith produces love and service when we keep our eyes on Jesus.



# Every[one] Everywhere: Bear The Load Together

March 1, 2026

Scripture: Galatians 6:2; Philippians 2:4

**Read the scripture noted above together:** Take turns reading if you prefer. Enjoy the different Bible translations we each read.

**Discuss the following context:** We were never meant to carry life alone. The body of Christ functions when people work together for the common good. Christ followers are called to carry one another's burdens (**Galatians 6:2**). This is not a suggestion. When we help shoulder someone's burdens, we fulfill the law of Christ – the law of love. Love looks beyond itself; love notices (**Philippians 2:4**). The church functions the way God designed when we share the load rather than carry life isolated and overwhelmed.

**Share your thoughts about the following questions:**

1. Compassion begins with awareness — seeing the hurt of others. What practices help you slow down enough to truly notice the pain around you?
2. Compassion moves us toward action, not just emotion. What is one step you can take this week to move from feeling compassion to demonstrating it in a tangible way?
3. Empathy means entering someone's experience rather than trying to “fix” it. Why do you think it's often easier to fix than to accompany? What helps you resist that instinct?
4. When a burden is shared, it becomes lighter. Who has helped lighten your load in the past, and how can that experience shape the way you walk alongside others now?

**Pray together:** Ask each other to share what is on your heart today.

*Thank God* that Christ carries us so we can carry one another, sharing burdens with compassion, empathy, and unity.

*Ask God* to help us refuse to allow people to struggle alone and instead step toward one another.

*Praise God* that the church functions the way God designed when we share the load rather than carry life isolated and overwhelmed.



# Every[one] Everywhere: Sacrificial Love

February 22, 2026

Scripture: Romans 12:10; 5:6-8; 2 Corinthians 5:14-15

**Read the scripture noted above together:** Take turns reading if you prefer. Enjoy the different Bible translations we each read.

**Discuss the following context:** Because Christ poured out His life for us, we are called to pour out our lives in love for others—honoring, serving, and caring in ways that reflect His selfless heart. Love is the greatest and most powerful motivator. Love is the foundation of following Jesus. When we love sacrificially, we make it unmistakably clear that people matter (**Romans 12:10**). What would it look like to take Jesus' love so seriously that it reshapes the way we treat every person around us?

**Share your thoughts about the following questions:**

1. **Romans 5:6-8** says Christ died for us when we were still powerless. How does that reshape the way you think about being “worthy” of God’s love?
2. If we “do not love out of duty but out of being deeply loved,” what changes in the tone and consistency of our love for others? Give a recent example.
3. **2 Corinthians 5:14-15** (TPT) says Christ’s love “fuels our passion” and frees us from self-absorbed living. What is one habit you’d leave behind if that were fully true in you?
4. In what situation could it require courage to prioritize someone else’s good over your own convenience, and what could taking that step look like?
5. Sacrificial love leads to freedom, joy, and deeper intimacy with Christ—where have you tasted that, and what keeps you from embracing it more fully?

**Pray together:** Ask each other to share what is on your heart today.

*Thank God* that Christ’s sacrificial love is something we receive and we reflect. We practice sacrificial love because Jesus first loved us with sacrificial love.

*Ask God* to help us express love in our everyday lives: choose to honor instead of criticizing, listen without speaking, serve without recognition, give to generously meet needs.

*Praise God* that love is how the world knows who we belong to and we are invited to live a love-shaped life.



# Every[one] Everywhere: Made to Move

February 15, 2026

Scripture: Acts 1:6-11

**Read the scripture noted above together:** Take turns reading if you prefer. Enjoy the different Bible translations we each read.

**Discuss the following context:** We were created and empowered by the Holy Spirit to carry the message of Jesus outward—we *are made to move* into God's ever-expanding mission. We might ask ourselves these questions: What is my role in God's mission? How can I possibly do what God is calling me to do? Is there a place for me in what God is doing?

Last words often reveal what matters most, so consider the significance and power of Jesus' last words. His final words before His ascension set the tone for His mission to move forward through His followers. It wasn't a casual farewell, it was His clearest, most urgent commissioning to His followers (**Acts 1:6-11**).

**Share your thoughts about the following questions:**

1. Jesus outlined a mission that is global in scope yet personal in impact. He defines *identity* (you will be my witnesses) and *direction* (Jerusalem – Judea – Samaria – ends of the earth). How does understanding both the *global* and *personal* nature of Jesus' mission reshape the way you view your identity as His witness?
2. Why do you think Jesus emphasized *waiting* for the Holy Spirit instead of acting immediately, and what might that look like in your own life today?
3. In what ways does the Holy Spirit's power differ from the types of power we often seek in the world? How should that influence the way we live out our faith?
4. Where do you see the difference between relying on your own strength and relying on the Holy Spirit? How might deeper dependence on Him change your impact?

**Pray together:** Ask each other to share what is on your heart today.

*Thank God* we are invited to join God's ever-expanding mission.

*Ask God* to help you move beyond your comfort zone and reach farther than you ever imagined.

*Praise God* that every Christ follower contributes to the expansion of God's messages – through prayer, presence, giving, sending, going. We are not spectators – we are participants, empowered by the Spirit!
